<b>1 - Women of the West Theme</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Male main character(s)</li><li>• Story not set in the West*</li><li>• Does not portray authentic western experience</li><li>• Theme &amp; content do not reflect WWW’s mission and goals</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Female main character(s)</li><li>• Story set in the West but could have happened anywhere; or, story partly set in the West*</li><li>• Generally portrays authentic experience</li><li>• Theme &amp; content generally reflect WWW’s mission &amp; goals</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Female main character(s)</li><li>• Western setting primary &amp; essential*</li><li>• Consistently portrays authentic western experience</li><li>• Theme &amp; content excellent reflections of WWW’s mission &amp; goals</li></ul>

<b>2 - Characterization</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Character(s) not developed</li> <li>• Stereotypical character(s)**</li> <li>• Dialogue not convincing</li> <li>• Characters generic, not interesting</li> <li>• Reader does not sympathize with main character</li> <li>• Didactic, preachy</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Main character somewhat developed</li> <li>• Generally no inappropriate gender, ethnic, racial, or other stereotypes**</li> <li>• Dialogue at times sounds unnatural</li> <li>• Character(s) interesting</li> <li>• Reader sympathizes somewhat with main character</li> <li>• Character’s “lesson” generally well presented</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Main character well developed</li> <li>• No inappropriate gender, ethnic, racial, or other stereotypes included**</li> <li>• Dialogue sounds natural</li> <li>• Character(s) original and unique</li> <li>• Reader sympathizes with main character</li> <li>• Any “lesson” subtle and organic</li> </ul>
<b>3 - Setting</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Setting not important to the story</li> <li>• Setting not described</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Setting of moderate importance</li> <li>• Setting described in conventional terms</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A strong sense of place is inherent in story</li> <li>• Setting vividly described, using most of the senses</li> </ul>
<b>4 - Plot</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Main character has no goal or problem she solves, or this is unclear</li> <li>• Story fails to hook reader; ending not satisfying</li> <li>• Implausible</li> <li>• Plot predictable</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Main character has goal or problem of marginal importance</li> <li>• Slow beginning leads to more action; or conclusion leaves some questions unanswered; or conclusion is not satisfying</li> <li>• Some points may strain credibility</li> <li>• Plot not new, but shows some freshness</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Main character has difficulty achieving important goal or solving important problem</li> <li>• Opening draws reader in; conclusion satisfying</li> <li>• Suspension of disbelief consistent</li> <li>• Plot original, fresh</li> </ul>

<b>5 - Voice</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Narrative voice lacking, confusing, distances reader from the story</li> <li>Point of view confusing</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Narrative voice dependable</li> <li>Point of view wavers or occasionally jumps</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Narrative voice engaging, fresh, distinct</li> <li>Point of view clear, consistent; or POV shifts clear and intentional</li> </ul>
<b>6 - Literary Qualities</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Poor or inappropriate command of language (slang, word choice, figurative language, etc.)</li> <li>Imagery confusing or nonexistent</li> <li>Premise conventional, simplistic, expected</li> <li>Not enjoyable or thought-provoking</li> <li>Story title ordinary, uninspired</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Moderate command of language (slang, word choice, figurative language, etc.)</li> <li>Imagery clear</li> <li>Premise not new, but well explored</li> <li>A pleasant read</li> <li>Title fitting, appropriate</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Consistently strong command of language (slang, word choice, figurative language, etc.)</li> <li>Imagery vivid, fresh</li> <li>Premise breaks new ground</li> <li>Thought-provoking</li> <li>Title intriguing or resonates with meaning</li> </ul>
<b>7 - Technical Conventions</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Frequent problems with grammar, punctuation, spelling</li> <li>Sloppy, wordy, repetitious writing</li> <li>Poor balance between dialogue and narrative</li> <li><b>Ineligible:</b> Story does not have a beginning, middle, and end</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Occasional lapses of grammar, punctuation, spelling</li> <li>Clear writing</li> <li>Adequate balance between dialogue &amp; narrative</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Clear grasp of grammar, punctuation, spelling; or reader trusts that conventions purposefully set aside</li> <li>Tight writing</li> <li>Good balance between dialogue &amp; narrative</li> </ul>
